Sarah Lowe, who earned undergraduate degrees in Spanish and Political Science in May 2006, became the most decorated off-the-court player in UF women's basketball program history. Among some of the recognitions she received were as a 2006 NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipient, the SEC's H. Boyd McWhorter Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award (third Gator ever to win the \$10,000 postgraduate scholarship award), the SEC's co-nominee for the NCAA Woman of the Year, a Fulbright Grant recipient and a Rhodes Scholarship finalist.
